### Additional Major, Concentration or Minor (15-36 credits minimum)

Credits will vary depending on requirements associated with major or minor selection. All students must take sufficient free electives to

		atta	ain the 120 credits required for graduation.		

Students may choose to use support courses to satisfy general education categories, but may not be required to do so. Note: If a course is used to satisfy two or more requirements (for example, a support course and Scientific Reasoning requirement), the credits are counted in only one place. Using a course to satisfy more than one requirement does not reduce the credit total required for graduation.

- Courses used to satisfy the general education requirements of the university must be taken from a minimum of six different academic disciplines. First Year Seminar and Level I Written Communications courses are exempt from this restriction. Courses may not be used to fulfill both major discipline and general education requirements.
- # These Scientific Reasoning General Education Category courses do not have to be a sequence or be from the same discipline.
- Level II, Level III, Vitten Communications and Diversity, Power Dynamics and Social Justice Courses may be used to satisfy requirements anywhere else in a student's program of study where they may apply. The credits are counted only in one area.
- \*\* Courses must focus on U.S. topics (Including in a comparative or transnational perspective), must cluster around a selected topic, theme or question, and must be selected in consultation with a faculty advisor. Courses must be at the 200 level or above.
- + 2 Courses on the approved list from the following Departments: Art + Design (Art History courses only); English; World Languages and Cultures (culture courses only); Music & Dance; Philosophy.
- ++ 2 Courses from the following Departments: Economics; Geography; History; Political Science; Sociology.
- \* Theory or Method courses chosen from among the approved list and MUST be taken PRIOR to IDS389: Students participating in Elementary Education 4+1 major will satisfy this theory/methods as part of their Education major
