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Students may choose to use support courses to satisfy general education categories, but may not be required to do so. Note: If a course is used to satisfy two or more requirements (for example, a support course and Scientific Reasoning requirement), the credits are counted in only one place. Using a course to satisfy more than one requirement does not reduce the credit total required for graduation.

- Courses used to satisfy the general education requirements of the university must be taken from a minimum of six different academic disciplines. First Year Seminar and Level I Written Communications courses are exempt from this restriction. Courses may not be used to fulfill both major discipline and general education requirements.
- These Scientific Reasoning General Education Category courses do not have to be a sequence or be from the same discipline.
- Level II, Level III, Level III Written Communications and Diversity, Power Dynamics and Social Justice Courses may be used to satisfy requirements anywhere else in a student's program of study where they may apply. The credits are counted only in one area.
- Courses are selected from department(s) representing the student's professional focus within community education with the approval of the department chair, program coordinator or advisor.
- + Choose one: PSY251 Child Growth, PSY252 Adolescent Psychology, PSY218 Childhood & Adolescence, or PSY322 Adulthood and Old Age. These courses may require PSY 101 as a prerequisite.
- **1** Choose from one of the English Minors: English, Writing, Professional Writing, Dramatic Literature or Film Studies.
